HEARING CHILDREN READ

Pause, Prompt, Praise: supporting children's reading processes

(From: Department of Education and Training, VIC, Teaching and learning Resources, 2014, with changes and additions by Diane Snowball, 2017)

The main purpose of reading is to construct meaning from the text. Effective readers actively monitor their comprehension as they read, correcting themselves if what they read does not make sense, sound right or look like the word in the text.

Pause, Prompt, Praise is a strategy, which aims to encourage students to monitor meaning and to selfcorrect. It can be used any time the student is reading aloud, but the more students understand why and how to use this strategy the more they will be able to use it independently in their own silent reading.

Three examples of Pause, Prompt, Praise

If you are listening to a student reading, the following examples are the types of interactions you could have to help the student understand the reading process and to learn about what good readers do to figure out unknown words and to self-correct when they make miscues, or mistakes, in their reading.

Pause

If a mistake occurs or if the student stops reading because a word is unknown, <u>pause</u>; wait to give the student a chance to self-correct or solve the problem. Allow a few moments for thinking time before expecting an answer. If the student is not able to solve the problem, try a prompt, such as the following.

Prompt

• Give a hint or lead to encourage a response: If the student stops at an unknown, word and cannot continue, ask him or her to read on to the end of the sentence or to reread from the beginning of the sentence, or perhaps the sentence before as well, and to try again. A brief discussion of the content or storyline may help the student to make a sensible guess at an unknown word, especially if you encourage this with questions such as, 'What is happening? What do you think this word could be?'

• If the student makes a substitution that does not make sense, prompt with clues about the meaning of the content or story, e.g. talk about the content of the text and tell the student the substitute word that was used, pointing to the actual word in the text. Praise the student for attempting the word. Reread the sentence using the student's word and ask questions such as, 'Does that make sense?' 'What else could it be so that it makes sense?'

• If the student makes a substitution that does

not look right, prompt with clues about the way the word looks, e.g. ask about one part of the word that looks wrong. 'You said Let's look at the word. Does it begin ... ?/ Does it end....? etc.

• If the student makes a substitution that does not sound grammatically correct, prompt by drawing attention to the way the sentence sounds by asking, 'Does that sentence sound right?' 'I will say the sentence again for you the way you read it...does that sentence sound right?' 'What else could that word be so that the sentence sounds right?'

• If the word is not correct after two prompts say, the word is..."

Praise

At all times it is important that students are praised and encouraged in their efforts. Use a variety of encouraging words and phrases to support students with their attempts. Your praise will greatly assist students' literacy development, particularly if your praise is quite specific about something the student has done well as a reader, rather than just a general comment like 'good job' or 'well done'. If you are not more specific then the students doesn't know exactly what was good and therefore he/she should do more of that.

• Praise when the student reads a sentence correctly:

'I like the way you $\ldots \!\!\!\!$ ''

• Praise when the student corrects himself or herself after a mistake: 'I liked the way you worked that out and self-corrected. Good readers are always monitoring their reading and self-correcting when necessary'.

• Praise when the student gets a word correct after your prompt: 'You worked that out well. What did you do to help you work it out? I like the way you ... to work it out.'

• Praise your students with comments that provide feedback about anything that effective readers do. These comments will be appropriate for the student's development as a reader and may relate to their specific reading goal. E.g: 'I liked the way you/ I noticed how well you...used the pictures

• To help you work out what's happening and to work out that word/sentence; ... looked through the book to see what it's about before you started reading the words;.....read the blurb on the back cover to predict what the book may be about;.....used your finger to help you track the words while you were reading;.....stopped using your finger now so that your reading is more fluent.

Three examples of Pause, Prompt, Praise

(Note: Although these examples use texts for younger readers, the strategy applies at all levels).

Example 1

When the student comes to a word she or he doesn't know and says nothing:

• Wait for 5 seconds,

• suggest that the student reads on to the end of the sentence or goes back to the beginning of the sentence and say, 'try that again',

• ask her or him to think of a word that would make sense, praise what the student does to solve the problem.

Sample text

At the circus there were lions, horses and clowns. Reader: 'At the ..''

Teacher: (wait 5 seconds) 'Try reading on to the end.' Reader: '...were lions, horses and clowns.'

Teacher: 'So what could this word be? Where do you find lions, horses and clowns?'

Reader: 'At the circus.'

Teacher: 'Right! Now read the whole sentence.'

Note: If the student has never been to the circus, and knows nothing about circuses, this prompt will not help. If you discover this then you will need to explain what happens at circuses and tell the student the word.

Example 2

When the student makes a substitution that does not make sense:

• Ask a question or two about the meaning of the story.

Sample text

The car raced along the road.

Reader: 'The car raced along the red''

Teacher: 'Well, that word looks a bit like red. Where does a car usually go?'

Reader: 'Along the road'

Teacher: 'Great, let's try again. Reread the whole sentence.' 'What did we do to make that correction? – We thought about what was happening and what would make sense. You can do that whenever you are reading – monitor your reading to make sure the sentence makes sense and use your knowledge to think about what the word could be. It needs to make sense as well as look right.'

Example 3

When the student makes a substitution that doesn't change the meaning of the story:

• If minor, ignore the mistake, unless this is something that the student does frequently and then you will need to use prompts to help the student.

• If significantly different, stop the reader and provide help.

• Ask the student to look carefully at the word,

'Does it look right?' Ask, 'How does it begin? Is it like any other words that you know?'

• Tell the reader the word, after two attempts.

Sample text

The children jumped into the car.

Reader: 'The children got into the car.'

Teacher: 'That makes sense. Good. They did get into the car but the word isn't got. Have a good look at the word.' (Teacher points to 'jumped'.)

Reader: 'Jump, jumped'

Teacher: 'That's right, good. Good readers are always monitoring their reading and thinking about what makes sense, what sounds right and what looks right and they self-correct when necessary.'

Note: Depending on the amount of text, its level of difficulty and the student's prior knowledge of the text, a mistake like this one may sometimes be ignored as the student is able to maintain meaning as he or she reads. An effective reader often predicts words and substitutes without reading each word correctly.

FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE INFORMATION FOR FAMILIES

Every Victorian child should have access to the world of learning opportunities that exist beyond the classroom. The Camps, Sport and Excursions Fund helps ensure that no student will miss out on the opportunity to join their classmates for important, educational and fun activities. It is part of making Victoria the Education State and the Government's commitment to breaking the link between a student's background and their outcomes.

CAMPS, SPORTS & EXCURSIONS FUND (CSEF)

School camps provide children with inspiring experiences in the great outdoors, excursions encourage a deeper understanding of how the world works and sports teach teamwork, discipline and leadership. All are part of a healthy curriculum.

CSEF is provided by the Victorian Government to assist eligible families to cover the costs of school trips, camps and sporting activities. If you hold a valid means-tested concession card or are a temporary foster parent, you may be eligible for CSEF. A special consideration category also exists for asylum seeker and refugee families, The allowance is paid to the school to go towards expenses relating to camp, excursions or sporting activities for the benefit of your child.

The annual CSEF amount per student is:

- \$125 per primary school students
- 225 for secondary school students

How to apply

New applicants should contact the school office to obtain a CSEF application form or download from www.education.vic.gov.au/csef

If you applied for the CSEF at your child's school in 2018, you do not need to complete an application form in 2019 unless there has been a change in your family circumstances.

You only need to complete an application form in any of the following changes have occurred:

• New student enrolments: your child has started or changed schools in 2019 or you did not apply in 2018 • Changed family circumstances: such as a change of custody, change of name, concession card number, or new siblings commencing at the school in 2019. Check with the school office if you are unsure.

(Tatura Netball Association)


The Toolamba **Junior Netball** will once again be running teams in the Tatura Netball Association of Friday nights.
